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February Mission Trip Sees Challenges

As we were preparing for this trip, many roadblocks popped up along the way that would have discouraged the fainthearted, however, we persevered and God was glorified.

Joseph was to travel on his U.S. passport, but the Russian consulate would not issue him a visa as they still considered him a Russian citizen. Joe is 19 and would be of draft age in Russia which caused much concern for his parents. Joe's parents, Roy and Esther Hendrix were to be our team leaders. They were disheartened and decided not to make the trip if Joe couldn't go. Joe, however, had other ideas and wanted his father to go and lead the team. Roy agreed and we were off. While in Russia Roy had dinner with Joe's grandmother, sister and cousin. As he was telling them of the situation, grandma said that in the adoption papers were letters exempting Joe from Russian military service. Roy was ecstatic at this revelation and determined to have the adoption papers translated upon his return to the U.S.

We thank God for his provision and care toward his children and we are comforted to know that Joe can come and go on his Russian passport as often as he wishes without fear of being drafted into the Russian military.

There were toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, soap, balloons. crayons, toys, and candy in each bag along with socks and underwear for each child in the orphanage. The girls also received warm turtlenecks and some of the boys received shoes and boots that were requested as the orphanage didn't have any large enough for some of the bigger boys. As you see, the kids were

delighted with all their gifts, but when we announced that we were taking them to a hockey game, well, you can imagine how excited they were then. Even the counselor that went along to supervise was very excited. Everyone had a great time.



For the two days we visited these kids, we had a great time doing crafts and playing games and just talking to them. We told the story of Joseph and emphasized how God was always with him through all his trials We did a craft which consisted of hands that folded and on the inside were Bible verses in Russian that told of how God was always with us. On the palm of the hand were the words "Jesus said" and each finger had a word written on it to complete the verse "I will never leave you". We worked puzzles

> and made things with perler beads. Lusia sang songs with the kids and they had a great time with the hand motions. We all joined in and had lots of fun trying to keep up with the kids. The children showed us their pet ferret and parakeets. Everyone enjoyed our time at this orphanage.

As with every other trip, visiting Pavlovsk and the children there is a must. This orphanage houses 550 disabled kids. Some have severe disabilities while others have mild problems.
